High School's Jr. Statesmen at Convention

Seven members of the Torrance High School chapter of Junior Statesmen of America, accompanied by three adult sponsors, attended the first regional convention of the year of the Southern California area held at Huntington Park High School last Saturday.

Those making the trip from Torrance High School included Barbara Specht, Joan Melvin, Wallace Fullmer, Roland Homolka, Lorna Isen, Pat Jesome and Betty Hawks. They were accompanied by Edward A. Reynolds, faculty sponsor of the group; Bert Smith, a representative from the Torrance 20-30 Club and Miss Louise Robbins, junior high school faculty member.

Two hundred delegates, observers and sponsors were present from 21 chapters from Santa Barbara, the Los Angeles area and south to San Diego. The meeting included legislative sessions in the morning and afternoon, with luncheon and a guest speaker.

The convention went on record as opposing reappointment of the California State Senate by a 51-15 vote, defeated after lengthy debate a resolution to Congress urging them to consider present inflationary trends and to correct them by applying corrective measures, and approved a resolution to give federal aid to education.

Coming events highlighting the year for the local Junior Statesmen include the second annual Holiday Ball, to be held Saturday evening, Dec. 11, at the Hollywood Riviera Club, Pacific Palisades; the fall state convention in San Francisco in November; the second regional convention at Grossmont High School, La Mesa, San Diego, in January; and the third regional convention to be held here in Torrance in March.

Officers of the Torrance High School Chapter, Junior Statesmen of America, for this semester are Barbara Specht, president; Wallace Fullmer, vice president; Dona Geary, secretary; Joan Melvin, treasurer; Roland Homolka, parliamentarian; Pat Weber, reporter.

Miss Specht, Roland Homolka and Mr. Reynolds were guest speakers at the 20-30 Club meeting Tuesday night at Vurp's on the subject of the Junior Statesmen movement and activities. The Torrance 20-30 Club recently took official action to sponsor the local High School Chapter of Junior Statesmen in its activities, especially in aiding various members of the local group to attend regional and state conventions.
