

Freeway Plan **Would Force** Homeseeking

Thirty thousand homes will have to be removed from the freeway route as now selected unless the routing is changed, according to Councilman Kenneth Hahn of Los Angeles and his brother, Assemblyman Gordon Hahn.

Present plan is to route the freeway south from Olympic boulevard on a line between Figueroa street and Broadway approximately one and one-half miles east of Western. This would necessitate an expenditure of \$5000,000 a mile to reme to the form of the proposition of the propos

They suggested lowering ex-penses and alleviating hard-ships by swerving the traffic artery east on Olympic bou-levard to Long Beach boule-vard. From that point the free way could drop south along the Pacific Electric right of way to the harbor.

A four-man committee, headed by Assemblyman Ernest Geddes of Pomona, took the proposal under consideration.
