Injury to Halfback Responsible for General Tartar Shake-up

Milo Goettsch, nimble-kneed and fleet-footed left halfback, will definitely be out of the Tartar lineup for the Beverly Hills game this Friday afternoon Coach Eddie Cole said yesterday.

Goettsch's name went on the Tartars injured list after last Saturday night's game against Santa Monica, in which he took a blow on the same shoulder he injured early in the season. Also on the injured list are Rano Sullivan, Onal Harris, Jim Taylor and Buddy Licht. However, all are expected to be ready for the Beverly game with the exception of Goettsch.

The injury to Coach Cole's scout-back has caused the mentor to make a major shake-up in the Tartar line-up. Boyd Crawford will go in at quarter replacing Dick Turner, who will move to fullback AND left halfback, where he will alternate with Jack Taylor. Turner and Taylor both will be in the game but will change positions to meet the demands of a particular play.

Buddy Licht will play right half.

Gil Avalos, who played a bang-up game of defensive ball against Santa Monica, will substitute for Turner on defense and move to right end on offense. It was the long-legged Avalos who spilled "Bobo" Lewis a yard short of a touchdown after a 69-yard race in the Santa Monica game. Coach Cole hopes to take advantage of Avalos' height and speed by making him a pass receiver on offense and an anti-pass tail back on defense.

The Tartars' defensive backfield will consist of Buddy Licht, Ray Maddock, Frank Earen and Dick Turner alternating with Gil Avalos.

Dave Bishop, who has been improving steadily, may get a share of the offensive duties in place of Licht.

Just what this shake-up will do to the unpredictable Tartars when they meet the strong Beverly Hills squad this Friday afternoon, is pretty much a matter of conjecture.

Beverly has shown steady improvement over its early season contests and will be stronger in many ways to the team they fielded against Lovola and Monrovia. Beverly lost those two games by scores of 32-27 and 12-5 respectively. They bounced into the win column in their first Bay League contest by squashing El Segundo 46-6. They fell before Inglewood 13-6, but trampled Leuzinger 32-7.

Sports Fan Praises Tartars for Conduct at Jordan Game

The following letter, received by John Steinbaugh, principal of Torrance High School from James C. Heartwell, secretary of the Long Beach Sports Boosters, is reprinted herewith without further comment:

The Principal
Torrance High School
Dear Sir:

I attended the Jordan-Torrance High School football game last night and while your school fielded a well-coached, hard-charging team, the fact that your student body in general conducted itself in a most commendable manner seemed even more important than the victory itself.

As a person who has pulled for Long Beach High School teams since 1920, I was, of course, rooting for Jordan. While I naturally was disappointed at their loss, it was enjoyable to sit near the Torrance rooting section and see a group conduct itself as yours did.

On more than one occasion your students were enthusiastic in giving a cheer for a Jordan man when one was injured. This is certainly sportsmanlike and something many other schools seem to have forgotten in a day when a series of unsportsmanlike remarks are too often heard when a player lies injured. These remarks, no doubt, are thoughtless, but a rooting section that does not use them certainly should be complimented.

At the close of the game it was a pleasure to watch your team come off the field and stand respectfully in front of the rooting section as the Torrance alma mater was played. To me your rooting section and your football team seemed to be a splendid example of unity in a student body. It was most gratifying to watch them act in a manner somewhat different than many do in this postwar era.

Although this is not a letter authorized by the Long Beach Sports Boosters, the thoughts of other members of our organization who sat on either side of me at the game, as well as my own, prompted me to write you. Last night my heart was with Coach Ernie Radford's Jordan boys as it will be through the entire season, but if they cannot go on to win the Bay League championship, I hope Torrance or a school with a student body of equally high ideals will finish at the head of the league.

You probably have never heard of the Long Beach Sports Boosters, a group of more than 300 sports-minded fans—including most of the coaches of our four high schools (Poly, Wilson, Jordan and St. Anthony's) and the Long Beach City College—who organized a year ago to "Boost Sports in Long Beach and Boost Long Beach in Sports," so I am taking the liberty of enclosing an article from the Press-Telegram. It is my personal opinion that your student body's combined rooting section and football team, cooperating so closely, will serve to increase the interest in sports and good sportsmanship, not only in Torrance but also in communities where Torrance High School plays.

Torrance lost to Santa Monica, 20-6.

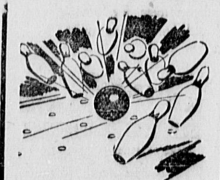
