Most health officials suggest that first diphtheria immunizations be given when children are six to nine months old. A booster immunizing dose should be repeated every two or three years until the child reaches the age of ten.

"If parents do not recommber just when their children were last immunized, or are in doubt as to whether they have been properly protected we urge that it be done now," Doctor Smiley said.

## Researchers Now Freeze Air Samples

Freezing the air of Torrance, Lomita and other areas of Los Angeles County is the latest method being used by the Air Pollution Control District to collect samples of various gases in the atmosphere, Dr. Louis C. MoCabe, smog control director, announced yesterday.

Researchers are using an odd-looking device, consisting of three U-shaped glass tubes connected in series, and filled with silica gel. The first tube is packed in lee which maintains a temperature around zero degrees centigrade.
