Torrance High School's Beepskin warriors will seek to duplicate last week's victory over El Segundo when they travel to Redondo this afternoon for the final chapter of the 1948 season.

Redondo promises to be a tough opponent for the locals. Last week they upset a strong Beverly Hills outfit.

Also last week the locals took their first league encounter greasing the outclassed Oilers by a 30-7 margin.

George Whiting started the ball rolling in the first period, driving for a touchdown on a double reverse from eight yards out, after a sustained drive from the Tartar 30-yard marker.

Which featured runs by Ron Higgins and Vaughn Stokoe.

Two plays after the kickoff the Oilers tallied on a 60-yard pass play from Don Savage to Joe Klevenger who also booted the extra point.

Trailing going into the second quarter Roy Swigart soon put the locals back in the game as he scored on a one-yard plunge.

Higgins crossed the goal late in the third frame on a 22-yard sprint around left and culminating a 91-yard march.

Early in the final quarter Whiting again scored for the Tarbabes when he intercepted an El Segundo pass and raced 42 yards on a brilliant run to the end zone.

In the closing minutes of the battle Jack Faren tossed a 40-yard pass into the waiting arms of Jim Smith, whose six points ended the locals' scoring efforts.

Aramis Dandoy, John Kulp, Jim Leech, Dave Baker and Gordy McQuillen were spark-plugs in the Tartar victory.

ORDINANCE NO. 435

The City Council of the City of Torrance does hereby ordain as follows: WHEREAS, there is a contradiction in Torrance Ordinance No. 326 of the City of Torrance, sub-section (1) of Section 8 and Section 1, Rule V of the Rules & Regulations supplementing said Ordinance No. 326, said Section 1 of said Rule V shall be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. Citizenship and Residence. No person shall be entitled to an examination for any position who is not a citizen of the United States and, unless otherwise ordered by the Personnel Board, a resident of the City of Torrance for at least one year immediately preceding date of filing application.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption and, prior to the expiration of fifteen (15) days from the date of its adoption, shall be published at least once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published and circulated in the City of Torrance and hereafter and thereafter the same shall be in full force and effect from the date of its adoption and adopted this 9th day of Nov., 1948.
