Bids for the construction of a gymnasium building at El Camino College, the junior college's first permanent building at El Camino College's first permanent building, are to be opened Dec. 13.

Decision to seek bids for this structure, estimated to cost \$225,000, and for the grading of the west portion of the campus, was reached at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Chairman Robert Russellalso said that the attendance and student personnel offices at the college would be enlarged immediately due to present overcrowded conditions.

Charles V. Jones is Torrance's representative on the board.

In other actions the Board approved with the architectural firm of Marsh, Smith and Powell of Los Angeles for plans and specifications of a Student Union-Home Arts building, an addition to the shop building and administration-classroom building. This latter building is to contain not only the administration offices but 13 additional classrooms.
