**Child Saved From Death
 By Quick-acting Stranger**

Mrs. Riley Buck knows there's screaming into the street. It was the quick thinking and prompt action of a passerby that saved the life of her three-year-old son Mikey who was near death from strangulation as the result of a freak accident at the Buck home, 17115 Falda avenue. The tot was in his high chair while his mother stepped from the kitchen into the back yard. According to police reports, the child was believed to have slipped forward in the chair, catching his chin on the food tray while his body hung off the seat causing the constriction of his windpipe. When Mrs. Buck returned to see her son suspended and apparently lifeless, she ran.

Warren Scrivner, 52, an oil company employee, ran into the house and administered artificial respiration to the child while neighbors called the ambulance and police.

Physicians at Harbor General Hospital, where the lad was taken for observation, credited Scrivner with saving the boy's life.

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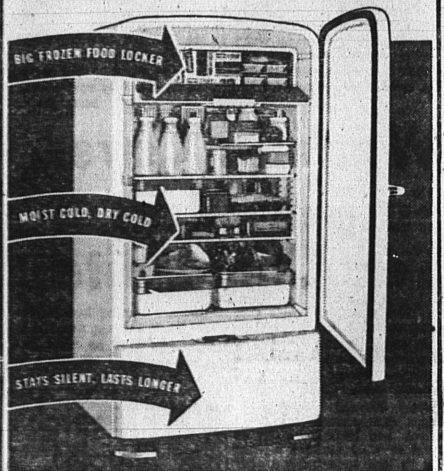
