Oral, Written Tests Necessary For Census Jobs

Applicants for employment as enumerators for the 17th Decennial Census of the 17th Congressional District will be required to pass oral and written tests to demonstrate their ability for the work, it is announced by James L. Pierceall, district supervisor here for the United States Bureau of the Census. The tests will indicate which applicants can best comprehend and follow the detailed and exacting written and oral instructions given to enumerators as they train for their assignment.

To date, Supervisor Pierceall stated, about 2000 applications have been received for approximately 600 enumerator positions to be filled. Among these are a considerable number of war veterans who will be given preference for appointment over non-veterans provided they meet other qualifications.

Applicants must be United States citizens of good health and character, have completed high school or have comparable experience, be between 21 and 65 years of age, preferably between 25 and 45, and be financially able to sustain themselves for four weeks before receiving their first salary check. Persons are ineligible for consideration if they draw federal retirement pay (other than social-security), are state or local government employees, law enforcement officers, officers of political organizations, individuals engaged in political activity or contemplating such activity during the census-taking period. Close relatives will not be considered for employment in the same locality in this area.

Pierceall stated that applications will be taken at District Headquarters, Naval Supply Depot, Torrance, California, through Friday, February 24 only. No applications will be received after February 24.

Chairman Tells 1950 Fund Goal

Mrs. Gladys Weston, of 2770 Pacific Coast Highway, who has been appointed chairman of the Torrance 1950 Red Cross fund raising campaign, during March, announced this week the goal of the Los Angeles campaign, of which Torrance takes part.

"The 1950 goal of the Los Angeles Red Cross chapter has been set at \$2,193,000—representing \$300,000 more than was successfully raised last year," stated Mrs. Weston.

"Red Cross nationwide has cut expenses this year by six million dollars, yet Los Angeles and vicinity fell so far short of its goal last year that, even with all economies, we must raise \$300,000 more in this campaign. In other words, if all contributors give the same as last year, Red Cross will fall short of its goal by a wide margin.

LAWYERS ASK COUNCIL TO LOWER \$24 TAX

Signed by ten of the city's lawyers, a request was presented to the city council Tuesday night asking the council to reduce the business license fees charged local barristers. They asked the fee be dropped from \$24 annually to \$10. The matter was referred to City Attorney C. Douglass Smith for an opinion.

"I can give my opinion right now," said Smith. "I am one of the ten who signed it."

Smith recommended that the fee charged lawyers, doctors, and dentists be dropped to conform with fees in other cities in the state.

Councilman Bob L. Haggard, local realtor, asked Smith: "You wouldn't care to include real estate brokers in your recommendation?"

New Stores To be Ready

A three unit store building with windows from floor to ceiling now under construction at 1615 Cravens Avenue will be completed by mid-April, according to Dr. Don C. Mosher, owner of the new store building.

The three units, all unrented at the present, will provide free parking areas in the rear of the store. Attractive rear entrances are being included in the plans, he said.

Each of the units, 18 feet by 60 feet, will be faced with white satin finish aluminum.
