Of interest to all was the announcement made by Dr. Geo. M. Uhl, City Health officer, that the largest mass X-ray survey in medical history will begin in Los Angeles March 22. Every one above the age of 15 will be eligible for a free chest X-ray to determine whether or not he has tuberculosis.
