That the council shall have the right to establish business licenses for the purposes of revenue and regulatory purposes. That the council shall have the right to grant certain franchises as deemed necessary to the best interest of the city. That no suit for damages against the city may be brought unless a claim has been filed with the city within 90 days after the occurrence of the action for which damages are sought. That the City Council shall have the right to borrow funds for budgeted expenses provided the anticipated revenue is such that the loan may be repaid within the fiscal year it was borrowed. . . . 
