\$1,000,000 High School bond to burchase sites for eventual use by the district on which to build two new high schools. Although the Board does not contemplate building any new high schools for at least 10 years, it was deemed, wise to purchase the sites now at a cost of approximately \$1500 per acre, rather than to wait until the price jumps to \$2500 per acre or more. Hull said that had the Board had the money when the Torrance Unified District was formed three years ago, it would have been possible to buy the same land now in mind, for less than \$1000 per acre.
"We just sold the Gardena farm site land for \$3000 an acre." he said.
Out of funds derived from the districts first bond issue of June 1948, the district has purchased four school sites, constructed three new elementary schools, a \$300-seat stadium at the high school, two additions of three classrooms each, a service unit and district library.
