

Municipal Judge Otto B. Willett In Justice Race

Torrance Municipal Judge Otto B. Willett, who is also judge pro tem of the Municipal Court of Long Beach, added his hat to the fing in the race for the office of Justice of the Peace of Gar-dena Township.

Also in the race are Judge John A. Shidler, incumbent, Elmo Morris, Municipal Judge of Gar-dena, and Dudley Gray, Gardena attorney.

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The Gardena township comprises all the area south of Gardena west of Western avenue and Miraleste.

Judge Willett is former deputy city attorney and city attorney of Torrance and maintains law offices here with Donald J. Hitchcock.

In his announcement of candidacy, Judge Willett said:
"In addition to my present duties, during the past eight years I have acted as Judge in the Gardena. Inglewood, Compton and Downey Townships, and in the City Courts of Compton, Manhattan Beach and Gardena.
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"During the time I have acted as Judge of the Torrance Court, only one case has been appealed, and this was affirmed on appeal. In my two years as judge protem in the Long Beach Municipal Court, only one of my decisions has been reversed."

Born in Effingham, Illinois, he was graduated from the University of Bullinois in 1933 with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Journalism. He attended law school at the University of Southern California, received his L.L.B. degree there in 1936, and was admitted to the California Barthe same year. He practiced law in Los Angeles from 1936 to 1940, and moved to Torrance in 1940, where he now resides at 221 Via Los Altos.

Married in 1937 to Glenna Rae Hiltbrand, Judge Willett is the father of two children, Steven James, 8, and William Glen, 5. He is a member of the Torrance Methodist Church, Inglewood Township Bar Association, Masonic Lodge of Torrance, Elks Cluth of Redondo Beach, Sigma Delta: Chi, Inational honorary journalism society; is a past president of the Rotary Club of Torrance, and member of the YMCA, Chamber of Commerce and Hollywood Riviera Homeowners Association of Torrance.
