SPEECH EXPERT TELLS CURE FOR STUTTERING

If your child should stutter: Relax. All children stutter to some extent when they are learning to talk. If the stuttering continues, the best thing that you can do is to ignore it. Don't call it to the child's attention, don't become excited, and above all do not label the child a "stutterer".

In fact, the stuttering may not be the child's fault. You may be at fault. Experts now believe that stuttering may be the warning signal that something is wrong in the child's emotional environment. If your child stutters, take a good look at your own home life. Does the child feel secure, wanted, and loved? Does he live in an atmosphere of emotional tension? The first thing that you can do to help your child's speech is to make sure that he has a healthy, normal, and happy home life.

Here are some do's and don'ts concerning stuttering:

DON'T tell the child to talk slowly or to stop stuttering.

DON'T allow anyone to imitate or ridicule the child.

DON'T regard him as abnormal.

DON'T nag the child. This applies to eating and other daily habits.

DO give the child plenty of affection.

DO be sure that he is in good physical condition.

DO build up his confidence, and allow him to assume the responsibilities.

DO make him feel wanted.

DO consult a qualified Speech Correctionist, Child Psychologist, or Child Psychiatrist.

The Torrance Unified School District now has a Speech Correctionist Program, and if your child is of school age and has any type of speech difficulty, you may make sure that he is receiving attention by contacting his school.

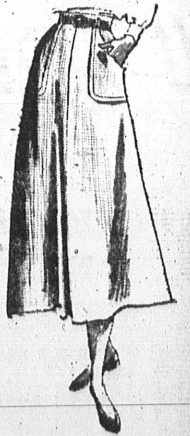
