# Slight Change In Mail Service Due

### Home Mail Sliced To One A Day

Only slight postal changes, and then not immediately, will be noted in Torrance as a re-sult of the recently announced curtailment of mail deliveries, it was revealed by Postmas-ter Mrs. Clara Conner, yes-terday.

is was revealed by Postmaster Mrs. Chara Conner, yesterday.

Mrs. Conner stated that the recent letter of instruction from Postmaster General Donaldson allowed local postal authorities until July 1 to make necessary cutbacks in carrier deliveries. Only sections of Torrance which will be affected by the economy move will be those residential sections of the city now receiving two deliveries a day.

The business and commercial routes will continue to receive twice-a-day deliveries, she said.

Window hours at the post office will remain in unchanged, with the ultimatum.

Pickup of mail from dropboxes will be made so as to allow all mail to be in the post office by 8:30 p.m. An early morning collection will be made to pick up any, mail dropped during the hight.

No layoff of any of the 18 carriers is expected, in spite of the new one-trip system. Mrs. Conner claimed that new routes occasioned by the many new tracts of houses being built at the present time will likely ab sorb the carriers who might have been laid off by the postal order.

## **Seeks New Rate Hike for Area**

Increase in telephone rates in Torrance as well as in other areas of the state, has been re-quested by the Pacific Tele-phone and Telegraph Company in an application to the Cali fornia Public Utilities Commis

A. B. Smith, manager A. B. Smith, manager of the company, said that all telephones here would be placed on an extended service basis, which would provide all subscribers with the opportunity of toll-free calling to Lomita, Redondo, Compton, Hawthorne and San Pedro.

An adjustment is asked in the coin-box rate from five cents to 10 cents and in the message rate from 3½ cents to 4 cents a unit.
