## All G.I.s Should Have Checks by Last of June

The United States Treasury will furnish its job of writing 16,000,000 National Service Life Insurance special dividend checks by June 30th, the date set at the start of the program, according to Paul D. Banning, Chief Disbursing Officer of the U. S. Treasury.

Banning reported fine cooperation between the Treasury, the Veterans Administration and the Post Office Department. VA delivers vouchers for over 200,000 payees each day, and the Treasury's check-writing machines turn out about the same number of checks four times a day, Banning said, and hurry them along to veterans.

Dividend checks can be forwarded to veterans who have moved, it was explained, if the veteran leaves a correct forwarding address with his post office. Most veterans who move are doing this, Banning declared.

A spokesman for the VA said that veterans who have not received their dividends, but who have got an acknowledgment for their applications, will only slow up the process if they write to the VA asking why the checks have not come.

There are many reasons for the non-arrival of checks, including changes of address without notice to the post office, it was declared. Among them are duplication of service serial numbers; another is because the veteran has a long name or address which requires special hand-addressing instead of machine handling; where a person had several insurance policies, such as the case with many aviation cadets; money owed the government by the veteran under certain conditions; and faulty addresses and incorrectly spelled names.

Those who have not received acknowledgments of applications should submit another application marked duplicate and mail it to Veterans Administration, National Service Life Insurance Dividend Division, Washington 25, D. C.

## Darby Irked by Public Spending To Lure Votes

"Even in government you can't get something for nothing," stated Lomita's Supervisor, Raymond V. Darby, candidate for Lieutenant Governor, in a recent state-wide radio talk hitting at today's political trend of attempting to win the voter's favor and support through the proffer of bigger and better prizes in the form of public spending.

As an example of the surprising lack of understanding in some quarters about governmental spending, Darby points to those interested in furthering public housing. Asked where the free money is to come from they naively reply, "Why from the Federal Government."

"I am convinced," stated Darby, "that private industry can better supply this housing program than can any governmental agency, and on a better basis."
