Tenure Granted Teachers At El Camino College

Permanent positions were assured for 25 members of the faculty of El Camino College by action of the Board of Trustees at its regular bi-weekly meeting held at the college April 25. Faculty members affected are the provisions of the Education Code, teachege elected for the fourth consecutive year automatically acquire permanency in their positions.

On recommendation of College President Forrest G. Murdock, the Board also approved the employment of 44 probationary teachers who have been instructing at the college this syear and, in addition, authorized the employment of 22 additional instructors for the fall terrecommencing in September.
