

# Lovelady Takes Over Industrial Loop Lead

One industrial league team remains undefeated after five rounds of play—Lovelady Hardware.

In a thrilling 4-3 game Tuesday evening, Lovelady came out on the long end of the score against the heretofore unbeaten General Petroleum squad.

Spurred by the four-pitch hitting of Al Coast, Lovelady squeezed three runs across in the second and one in the fourth to put the game on ice. The winning run in the fourth came on a home run by Dick McIntuff, shortstop for the mill dealers, who also homered in the three-run third.

Dick Morgan had the tossing for the losing GP team, allowing only six scattered hits. Two walks and McIntuff's four-bagger in the third spoiled his evening, however.

Harvey Machine moves up behind Lovelady in the standings. Harvey has played one more game than the other teams, and boasts a 5-1 record.

General Petroleum and National Supply are tied for third honors with four wins and one loss each.

## Bank of America Buys Torrance School Bonds Worth \$2 Million

Outbidding two competitors, the Bank of America purchased the \$2 million in Torrance Unified School District bonds voted in by a 1-01 majority last March 20.

The bank offered 3 1/4 per cent interest and a premium of \$20,200 when bidding for the bonds this week.

Payments of the premium to the district will cut down the interest rate to a net of 2 1/4 per cent, Superintendent J. H. Smith reported.

The sale was conducted by the board of supervisors. Edmund W. Ingram, district business manager, recommended the sale to Bank of America.

The sold bond revenues will be used to buy sites for two new high schools, rehabilitation of the present high school, and purchase of new sites and construction of new elementary schools.

The disposal units and would still depend upon regular garbage collection.

City Attorney George Powell pointed out that City Engineer Paul J. Smith stated that the legality of the devices being attached to sewer lines was being challenged in some communities.

Drals said he realized there would be complications but said that he had read of eastern cities that had used the kitchen appliances as an answer to garbage disposal problem.

Since all rubbish-tended trunks from through out Los Angeles County would have to use Torrance streets to reach a proposed dump site near Waterford, the City Council Tuesday night took action to oppose the opening of the site.

City Councilman George Powell pointed out that Crownshaw Boulevard, Pacific Coast Highway, and Hawthorne Boulevard were the only highways leading to the proposed dump.

To be held on June 16 by the Los Angeles Zoning Board is a request for a permit by Ben Keganian, Los Angeles dump operator, to use several huge excavations south of Waterford as a cut and cover dump. The huge excavations were formed by the mining operations conducted by the Dionite Corporation. The company is planning to abandon their mining activities there and would eventually make available some 11 acres as a possible dump site.

## North American Wing Assembly Moved To Doak

Assembly of wings and center sections for F-86 Sabre and F-95 jet fighters is now underway by North American Aviation at the Torrance plant recently leased from the Doak Aircraft Co.

Business fixtures and other equipment used for wing assembly work moved to Torrance from the company's Los Angeles plant where the work has been done in the past. Approximately 150 employees were transferred from the Los Angeles plant. No additional personnel are anticipated for this operation in the near future.

North American leased the Doak facility for two years, with option to renew the lease after that time for wing assembly operations on the F-86 Sabre jet fighter, and the F-95, an all-weather jet interceptor. Both airplanes are in production for the Air Force.
