"Let's not kid ourselves," Bruce Thomas, noted lecturer, writer for Harper's Magazine and foreign correspondent, warned members of the Torrance Rotary Club Thursday night, "Germany is still 95 per cent Nazi."

The speaker, due to leave soon on his 53rd trip to Europe in the past 15 years, expressed the desire to have each member of the local club spend one seek in Europe to see what Russia is doing to Stalin-controlled Germany and other countries.

Thomas was introduced by W. T. "Hap" Tillotson, president of the local service club and program chairman for the evening.

"Fifty per cent of those who "Fifty per cent of those who died in the Russian zone of Berlin died of malnutrition— a condition purposely forced on the Germans by the Russians in their "cheap war" to conquer Europe," the speaker said.

Praising the Marshall Plan he stated:

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
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
