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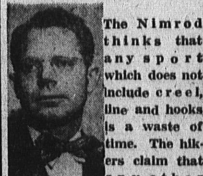

We go for a change and return changed, for the better. Vacations are the salt and pepper of existence.

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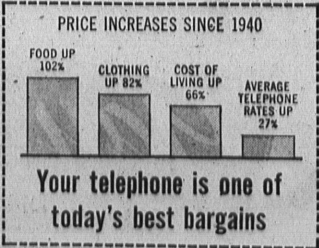
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
