Permit Totals Top Old Records

Building permit totals moved another big step nearer the all-time record here during June, when the year's total skyrock-eted to \$5,295,807, according to figures released this week by James Dresser, city building in spector.

Total evaluations for June were \$518,788, Dresser revealed. This represents an increase of \$30,701 over the total permits issued during May of his year.

At this time in 1948—a record year—the total value of permits issued had reached only \$4,034,896. The total for the 1948 record was \$7,876,825, or just \$1,681,018 more than the half-year mark for 1950.

City Manager George Stevens, who had predicted earlier this year that the year's total would reach the \$10 million mark, is now inclined to up his prédiction a shade. He and other city officials now say it might get to \$12 million.


