Faced with eliminating the manual training and home-making courses from the seventh and eighth grades or choosing double sessions, the board elected to give the training.

board elected to give the training.

At a meeting of the board Tuesday night it was pointed out that in a city as industrial as Torrance, the elimination of the manual training classes to make room for more classrooms would mean that many future industrial workers would never again be in a position to receive the training.

The board heard arguments for both sides of the problem.

Those in favor of diccarding the shop training for boys and cooking and sewing classes. For girls, felt the double sessions would deprive the children of other educational opportunities and force a handicap on parents.

The board expressed the opin-ion that the 20 minutes loss, only at some schools and only in certain grades, and the in-convenience to parents, was not a strong enough cause to aban-don the manual training class-es.

Teachers and equipment al-ready have been hired and pur-chased, according to Emmett W. Ingrum, business manager of the Torrance Unified School

of the Torrance Unified School District.

To help solve the crowded classroom conditions where pos-sible, the board agreed to aban-don the use of cafeterias as such, to make more classrooms.
