Card Party Plans Slated For Tonight

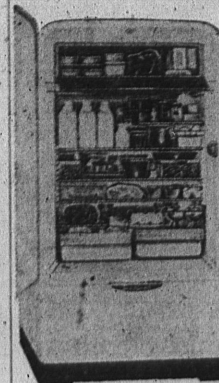
