## \$2,214,422 OK'd for **Budgets in 1950-51**

# Spending of \$2,214,422 of the taxpayers' money received approval this week as city and school budget committees met to set the amount of spending to be done during the coming fiscal year. At a meeting of the Tax and Budget Committee in the City Hall Monday evening, four lay advisors to the city's Budget Committee 'approved' of a city budget of \$759, 740. Tuesday evening the Board of Education at a regular meeting approved and formally adopted the proposed budget for the forthcoming school year of \$1,494,682. The school budget reflects an increase over last year of \$264,849. Increased assessed valuation of the city over a year go made it possible for the Board to increase the budget to meet demands without hiking the tax rate. The school rate will remain at \$1.65. ## Family of Six Rescued in Flood

Washed into a swirling creek by flood waters overflowing the highway, a family of six Normandle avenue residents was rescued from the top of their inundated auto last Thursday in Meade, Kansas.

Rescued by highway workers and volunteers were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Baarsch, 22404 Normandie avenue and their four children Jerry, 12; Robert, 9; Lavonne, 19 and Dorothy, 13..

Baarsch is employed at the Crenshaw plant of the American Standard Corporation.

The near-tragedy occurred as the Baarsch auto was being towed across the flooded

The Baarschs, intent on spend-ing a vacation in Austin, Mina: and in New York, spent their time in Meade while the auto was dried out and overhauled.

The accident occurred on U.S. Highway 54, adjacent to Crooked Creek, approximately five miles outside of Meade.

After the car left the high-way, Baarsch and his family crawled out of the car and onto the top of the vehicle: High-way crews working nearby to keep the highway open, threw the marooned family a rope by which they were finally pulled to safety.

The area, normally bonedry in summer time, was hit by a flash flood last Thursday fol-lowing a forrential thunder storm.
