

District Governor to Address Torrance Rotary Club Tonight

Rotary clubs in 83 countries throughout the world are united in an endeavor to promote international understanding, goodwill, and peace.

That will be the message brought to Torrance Rotarians tonight by Dr. G. Edd Norwood, Governor of District 190, of Rotary International, when he speaks to the club at their regular meeting in the Junior Women's clubhouse.

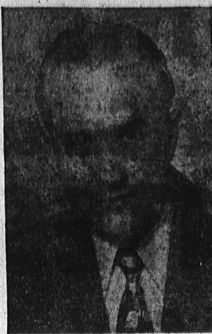
Dr. Norwood will meet earlier with club President John Steinbaugh and other officers and committee chairmen.

Previewing the report he will bring to the local Rotarians tonight, Dr. Norwood said Rotary International is spending \$750,000 over a three-year period to create a better understanding among the business and professional men of different nations. "The Rotary Foundation Fellowships, which enable outstanding graduate students to study for one year in countries other than their own, is an important part of this great project," he said.

Since 1947, Fellowships have been awarded to 195 students in 25 countries with grants totaling approximately \$500,000. "There is a striking parallel between the Rotary International program and the United Nations Charter," Dr. Norwood said.

Unemployment Figures Show Slight Increase

Slight increases in the total unemployed seeking work through the California Department of Employment branch here was noted during the past month, according to Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance branch.

Overall figures for those registered with the office totaled 683 at the end of last week. One month ago, the total was only 625, the lowest it had been this year.

All Ex-Marines Not Subject To Call To Duty

Marine enlisted veterans are not subject to call by the Marine Corps unless they actually enlisted in the Reserve upon discharge after World War II, according to a recent release from the Armed Forces Public Information Service.

"Contrary to the general impression," Colonel I. O. Brauer, director of the Eleventh Marine Corps Reserve District, said, "Marines discharged after the war were not put in the Reserve for 10 years or any other period. Only those Marines who actually signed enlistment papers and were sworn in the Reserves are subject to recall," Colonel Brauer emphasized.

Officer personnel, other than those given medical discharges, are released to the Reserve when discharged.

Over 72 per cent of Norway is unproductive.

The August report indicates that those seeking work in the skilled classification—mechanics, welders, electricians, carpenters—continue to show declines, while other classifications reflect slight increases.

Persons registering for employment in skilled classifications totaled 116 on the August report, while a month ago the total was 135.

Other classifications showing increases include clerical, which rose from 128 to 140; professional, which rose from 28 to 36; and sales people rose from 45 to 50.

"These figures by no means indicate that employment in Torrance is decreasing," Miss Ellis said.

Much of the registration for work in the local office reflects the influx of workers to this area, the manager explained.

"There is quite a demand for skilled workers over 26 years of age and for skilled clerical workers," Miss Ellis said. She also said the office normally had a greater demand for such skills than it could fill.

Figures for the year are: January—743, February—899, March—819, April—816, May—834, June—731, July 625, and August—663.
