Red Cross Ships Blood For Fighters

The Red Cross last week-end throughout the nation was loading whole blood aboard air liners for transport to battle-fronts of South Korea for transfusion use on wounded American Grs.

In Los Angeles 96 pints of whole blood were flown via Western Airlines to San Francisco Municipal Airport for shipment to Tokyo and 'thence to hospitals and Army Medical Corps units below the 38th parallel.

The shipment from Los Angeles will be added to that sent to San Francisco from Red Cross regional blood service centers in all parts of the country and will be part of 1400 pints to be airborne by a U. S. millitary transport.

Subsequent weekly shipments of whole blood will be hade up from collections from West Coast Red Cross Blood Centers only, with the Los Angeles division expected to supply a minimum of 1000 pints of whole blood every month for the exclusive use of the military.
