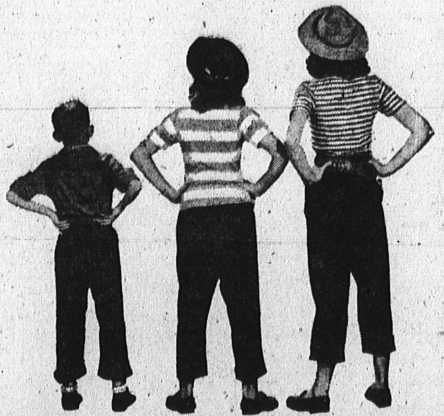
Mrs. Annie Olson, president of the Torrance unit and her committee have planned a busy year with special stress on hospital work and rehabilitation.

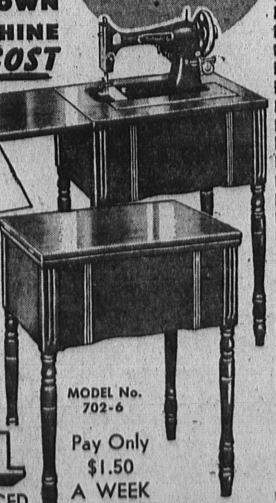
