Loyalty Oath Given Municipal Employees

City employees in all departments were this week signing new loyalty oaths which demand they swear (or affirm) that the individual is not and has not been for five years previously, a member of any organization advocating the overthrow of the government of the United States.

All employees will be required to take the oath before they draw their next salary checks. First group consisting of some 32 employees Monday afternoon took the oath as administered by City Clerk A. H. Bartlett.

Under the state law, Assembly Bill 61, recently signed by Governor Warren, the workers must designate any group to which they have belonged and which was considered subversive. The oath demands that the employee agree not to join any organization or party, political or otherwise, which advocates the overthrow of the federal or state governments.

Methodists to Resume One Service

At a recent meeting of the Official Board of the First Methodist Church, it was voted that the 9 a. m. worship service should be discontinued and that all the efforts of the minister and choir should be centered on the main morning service which hereafter shall begin at 10:50 a. m.

This early service was started, according to Rev. C. E. Miller, to relieve the crowded conditions at the regular morning service. Since that time, new pews have been ordered which will increase the seating capacity of the sanctuary. These pews will be installed during the first part of November, according to the present plans.

Beginning Sunday, the schedule of services of The First Methodist Church will be as follows: Church school for all ages of children, youth, and adults from 2 years of age up will begin at 9:30 a. m. The Morning Worship Service will begin at 10:50 a. m. Rev. Miller will preach on the theme, "The Conversion of Paul." Special music will be rendered by the choir under the direction of Vernon Robinson, Minister of Music. The Methodist Youth Fellowship will meet in the evening at 7.
