Herman will also conduct an audience participation routine in which "everybody gets into the act."

Free coffee will be served with a generous helping of cake to those who drop in at the market on Friday and Saturday.

The massive layer cake was baked and decorated by Alma Schultz of Alma's Bakery. Adorning the top and sides are gayly colored floral designs, while on the face of the cake is a replica of the front of the Greater Torrance Market.

C of C Members Marking Ballots For Directors

With three vacancies soon to occur on the Board of Directors of the Torrance Chapter of the Chamber of Commerce, the members of the booster group this week were balloting to pick two members to the board from the general membership.

The third vacancy will be filled by appointment of the board after the two elected officers are seated.

Involved are the positions now held by Reed Parkin, W. T. Tilton, and Grover C. Whyte.

The candidates receiving the four highest votes on the primary ballot will be placed on a runoff ballot which will be mailed to members on November 15. An election committee composed of Russell Lund, Darwin Parrish, and Calvin Newall will certify the election and declare the members receiving the first and second most votes to be elected.

The primary ballots must be returned to the Chamber office by noon, November 15. The runoff ballots must be returned by November 22, according to Blaine Walker, executive secretary of the Chamber.

SCHOOL BOARD RATED AMONG TOP IN NATION

A recent poll conducted by the Teachers College of Columbia University indicated that the Torrance Board of Education was rated among the top in the nation.

In a letter received this week by Board President John A. Shidler, and written by Daniel R. Davies, professor of education at Columbia University, the board was informed that a recent poll among state superintendents, state school board officials, and professors of education administration, labeled the Torrance Board as "outstanding."

The university is now conducting a survey among the top school boards of the nation and picked Torrance as one of the school districts to participate. In a 12-page questionnaire, the survey seeks to discover "what makes the local school district tick." The information is being gathered to disseminate to other school boards in the United States.

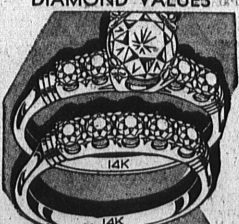
