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Mystery of Four 'Missing' Victims Cleared by Driver

Jury Finds Youth Not Negligent

A coronor's jury Monday afternoon cleared a 16-year-old Torrance High School youth, John Dale Spiller, of any criminal negligence in the death of a 74-year-old retired nurse on November 6.

Spiller, who lives at 1103 Beech avenue, was cleared by a six-man jury of any criminal responsibility in the death of Miss Della E. James, 915A Amapola. Miss James died after being struck, according to the police reports, while crossing Torrance boulevard at Amapola avenue shortly after dark on Monday evening, November 6.

Russell Lund, local insurance broker, was elected foreman of the jury by the five other jury members including Sam Levy, Robert Almond, Blaine Walker, A. C. Turner, and Edwin B. Brown.

The jury instructed Lund to make a recommendation that the Torrance City Council investigate the section of Torrance boulevard to ascertain if the highway is sufficiently lighted.

Miss James' death was the second within 60 days to occur within that neighborhood on Torrance boulevard. The earlier accident having occurred one block west. On September 5, William H. Green, 88, was killed as he was crossing Torrance boulevard at Cota avenue in a similar auto-pedestrian accident.

Plans Discussed for Visit Of Chest X-Ray Unit

Youthful Owner Of \$17,000 Auto Clears Mystery

Mystery shrouding a flaming \$17,000 automobile and four "victims" who disappeared shortly after an accident last Sunday, lifted yesterday as the owner of the car appeared to relate an action-packed story and one with a touch of heroism.

The mystery started Sunday morning when Torrance police received a call that a car, being towed at a high rate of speed, broke loose, skidded 300 feet, spewing four occupants about the countryside as it overturned and then burst into a bubbling mass of flames.

Witness to the incident which occurred on Pacific Coast highway near Vista del Parque, was City Judge Otto B. Willett. He and other witnesses said the injured were hustled into the towing car and apparently rushed to the hospital.

UNABLE TO LOCATE A check by Sgt. Bill Evans, of the Torrance Police Department, of local hospitals, disclosed that no one had reported for treatment about the time of the accident.

By Tuesday afternoon no one had come forward to claim the charred and demolished wreck, until George Joseph Ansite, of 321 Osgood street, Long Beach, came forward with the following version of the incident:

I WAS ALONE

"I was clipping along Pacific Coast highway when suddenly in the middle of the road appeared a pedestrian. I swerved, hit a bank, overturned, and—blackout. When I came to, a friend of mine who was following me; Fred Tilden of Long Beach, was pulling me from the flaming car. There was no one with me and I can't imagine what the judge saw when he said there were four people lying on the ground."

Ansite said the demolished car was at one time insured for \$17,000. It was a 1939 Packard convertible with a Chaparral custom body and mahogany interior. He said he was enroute to Hermosa Beach to sell the car when the accident happened.

TAKES RAP ON HEAD

"I had just dropped my wife in Long Beach. Boy, am I glad she wasn't with me," he stated. Ansite suffered a bump on the head, a cut hand and other minor injuries.

Asked why he had not come forward to identify himself sooner, he replied:

"I was afraid you were going to ask me that. You see, I just got married. You see, I understand I am due in Torrance court on a traffic ticket. I just got married, and frankly I wanted to raise the money before the judge set the fine."

When Ansite does show up on his traffic citation he will appear before Torrance's City Judge Otto B. Willett, witness to the freak accident.

The issue, carrying many money-saving bargains offered by local markets, will be published two days earlier than usual to allow local housewives to prepare for Thanksgiving festivities.

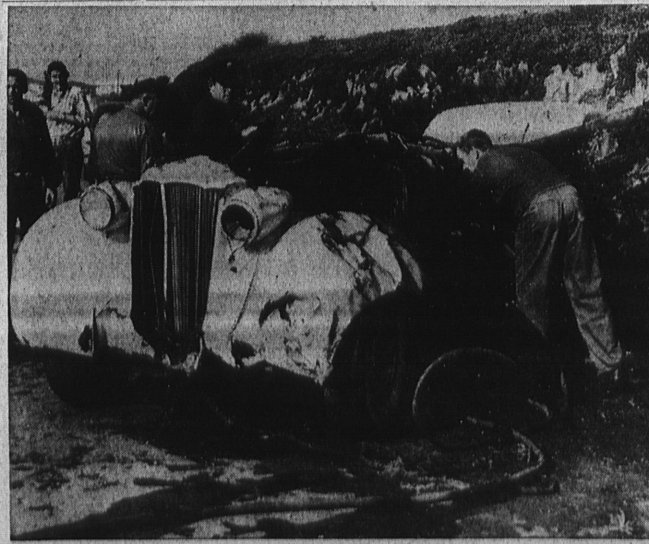
Carrier boys are to report to their distributors at the same hour Tuesday as they would normally on Thursday.

Deadline for display and classified ads will hit on Saturday at 1 p.m.

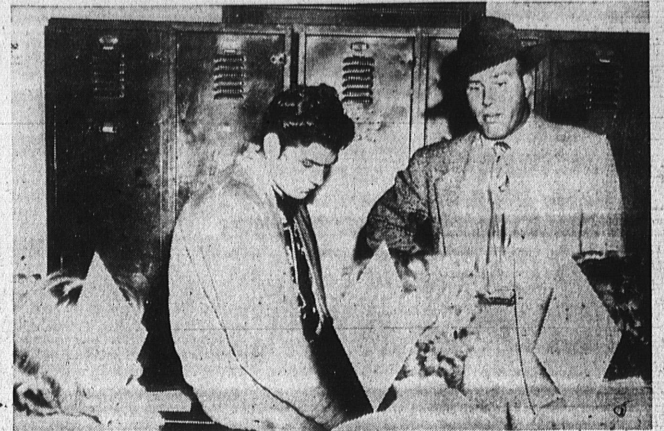

Bridegroom to Face Charges In Wave of Minor Sex Crimes

An alleged overfondness for shapely high school co-eds had a San Pedro bridegroom of two months in plenty of trouble today, none of it matrimonial.

Fire Threatens Chemical Plant

A spectacular fire which broke out at the Stauffer Chemical Company at 202nd and Normandie yesterday afternoon was brought under control by Los Angeles City Firemen after an hour's battle.

Damage in the fire, which started in a still in the company's pilot plant, was estimated by firemen and company officials at \$5000.

Teachers To Receive Pay Hike

Provided funds are available next July, and there is every indication they will be, salaries of Torrance teachers will be upped from \$200 to \$300 yearly to bring the salaries more in line with other districts competing for a nearly-exhausted supply of teachers.

The action taken by the Board of Education at its regular meeting—on November 7 will provide a beginning wage of \$3000 annually for teachers with an A. B. degree and a regular credential. Beginning pay at present is \$2550 according to Dr. J. Heinrich Hull, superintendent of schools.

OVERDUE He said the present pay schedule had not been adjusted since it was adopted three years ago. He said other districts had increased the pay schedule for both teachers and classified personnel (janitors, clerks, and maintenance men) and were luring teachers away from Torrance's rapidly expanding school district.

Dipping into the available supply of teachers also is the long hand of Uncle Sam.

Also upped were the salaries of classified personnel. The raise amounting to \$10 monthly will become effective December 1. Due to signed teacher contracts, covering the entire year, the teacher increases will be effective in July of 1951—end of the current fiscal year.

REFLECTED IN BUDGET

The increases will be reflected in raises in the budget item provided for teacher salaries of approximately 2½ per cent, Dr. Hull said. At present 65 per cent of the operating expenses are paid out in salaries. Under new schedule from 65 to 70 per cent of the budget will be allocated for salaries. He said that a recent survey of other school districts indicated that closer to 70 per cent was being allocated in comparable districts to Torrance.

"If we are to lure the new teachers who will enter the field in the fall, we must bait our hooks with silver, not feathers," Dr. Hull said. He indicated that already certain vacancies in elementary teaching positions were difficult to fill with capable instructors.

The \$300 yearly raise will be realized by those teachers earning from \$2850 to \$4100 while those in the upper brackets, or above \$4100, will realize boosts of only \$200.

The same rate increase was voted on the principal schedules.
