Preliminary plans to form two leagues in the area now covered by the Bay League were approved at a league meeting Monday evening, and the move one goes before the CIF council Dee, 16 for final approval.

Recommended by league officials was the formation of two six-team leagues. Under this setup Torrance would find it self in a loop composed of Santa Monica, Inglewood, Leuzinger, Redondo, Beverly Hills and Torrance.
