One of the greatest stock car races in the history of the Carrell Speedway has been scheduled for Sunday afternoon, December 31, when the 300-lap New Year's Eve Stock Car Championship racers get the green flag.

The race will be the longest stock car event at the track since its opening race a few years ago.

Time trials will start Sunday morning, and the big race is set to get under way at 2:30 p. m.

Warriors Finish Grueling Tour with Two Wins, Four Defeats

El Camino's basketball invasion of Northern California, although bringing only 2 wins and 4 losses, could easily have been a successful trip had the Warriors gone the other way.

The Warrior hoopers journeyed to Sacramento on Tuesday, December 12, and in the first game of the six-game tour lost to Grant Tech by a 55-40 score that night. Against the Saracens the Warriors looked a bit sluggish, obviously tired from the 10-hour ride from Los Angeles. Jack Turner potted 10 points for the El Camino cause, but it was not high enough to offset Joe Goyes 18 digits for Grant Tech.

On Wednesday evening El Camino took on a Sacramento Panther team that was undefeated in five contests, and upset their apocryphal in an overtime period, 58-55. This was the outstanding accomplishment of the Warrior casabamen's trip, as they evened Sacramento's early 15-point lead to build up a 61-44 advantage of their own.

HIT THREE

With only a few minutes to go in the game, the Panthers hit on three field goals to tie the contest to 53-all as the clock expired. Bill Hazelwood sank the first points of the overtime period for Sacramento, but Bob Chambers of EC hit in quick succession to give El Camino a two-point lead. From there on they froze the ball to pick up a hard-earned 58-55 win. Jim Cline was big scorer of the tilt with 18 points to Hazlewood's 13.

Playing the Vallejo Redskins the following night, the El Cami met a team without a win in 9 starts. Vallejo was up high for the game, and El Camino went off the court at halftime with a narrow 30-29 margin. Midway through the second half, Vallejo had a sudden spurt that netted them a 1-point lead, but immediately El Camino started to click, and inside of 5 minutes rolled up a thirteen-point advantage. The final count was 60-50, with the Warriors grabbing a 2 won and 1 lost trip advantage, and evening up their season total at five, wins and five losses.

CHAMBERS HOT

Four EC starters hit for double figures. Chambers had 15 for high point honors, Willy Shea and Turner swished through 11 digits each, and Bob Flanagan potted an even 10 for the night. Cline, the other starter, put through 8 points.

Friday was supposed to be an open night, but the tilt with San Francisco City College, scheduled for the following Mon-

day, was moved up 3 days. El Camino whizzed to a 25-21 lead at the half, but playing for the fourth consecutive night, the Warrior hoopers could not keep up with the Rams.

San Francisco gained a 5-point lead near the end of the game, and in attempting to play control ball, let the Warriors score 3 points. With only a few seconds left, a Ram shot was taken by El Camino in the air and passed down court quickly. The Warrior man broke into the clear, but missed his lay-in shot as the final buzzer sounded. Jim Cline and "Flip" Flanagan each put in 14 points, which tied Harvey Cranow of the winners for high point honors.

NIGHT WORK

Taking to the hardwood for the fifth straight night, El Camino met what was probably their best opponent all year, San Mateo. The Bulldogs were led by Bud Bonner, a tricky ball handler and an excellent shot, as they downed El Camino 47-41. Jim Ogilvie put 16 points through and Bonner 18, to account for most of the San Mateo scoring. The contest showed only 17 fouls being called in the entire game, 7 on San Mateo. Turner hit for 10 points to lead the EC barrage.

Resting on Sunday and Monday led up to the final game of the trip, with Marin Junior College on Tuesday evening. The Tars grabbed an early lead, potted it up to 14 points, went to the dressing room with an 8-point margin and held it until the last few seconds. Desperation long shots by the Warriors paid off to close the gap, but the Tars still hit consistently to walk off with a 69-50 verdict. Flanagan put in 12, Chambers 10 and Cline 7 to aid the Warriors, but it was not enough.

Flanagan now assumes the team scoring leadership by two point over Chambers, 129 to 127. Cline has 111. "Flip" has put through 37 of 47 free throw

Tartars, Narbonne, To Clash Tuesday

In something more than the usual practice encounter, Narbonne's golden Gauchos roll northward Tuesday afternoon to settle once and for all the basketball championship of the greater Lomita Torrance area.

Seourage of the rugged Eastern-Marine circuit where they are in a three-way tie for the lead, Coach Wayne Sloss' Gauchos are champing at the bit to meet what is considered to be one of the top Torrance cage outfits to come out of Tartarville in several seasons.

Somewhat of a personal duel is expected to develop between Narbonne's Ready Eddie White, high scoring forward and all-city candidate, and Torrance's Aramis Dandoy, who was named to the all-tournament team at the Long Beach Invitational Tournament two weeks ago.

Should both Sloss and Torrance Mentor Cliff Greybehl decide to employ zone defenses Dandoy could readily be assigned to White and vice versa.

The Torrance flash and Narbonne Guard Bill Johnson, who also operates as student body president at the Lomita citadel of higher learning, will have plenty in common. Dandoy plays for Torrance yet lives in Lomita; Johnson is a Torrance resident. Both attend their respective schools through special dispensation.

The record underates both Gauchos and Tartars. Narbonne is charged with three league losses—yet hasn't lost near that many.

Two of the defeats came via the forfeit route with the Gauchos paying a heavy penalty for a fist-throwing ruckus that occurred in the Narbonne gym after a contest with Bils last January. Athletic relations were severed and Narbonne got the forfeits.

Other than that, Narbonne has downed Jordan twice and San Pedro once without losing to either. This pair happens to be the nearest Gaucho competitors. Torrance made an excellent showing in the Long Beach tourney and, their League season starting much later than the Eastern-Marine, is just getting rolling.

The Tartars downed a rugged

Ventura quintet, 38-28, then lost to Long Beach, 49-31, in the quarter finals. The latter contest, however, is not to be taken as a true test of Tartar strength. The ball was in and out of the hoop for the Torrance five all afternoon long.

Pressing Dandoy for honors with the Tartars is lanky Jim Taylor, who handles the pivot post. The Gauchos will meet Taylor with sky-scraping Marv Ruebel, considered by many to be the most improved man on

the Narbonne squad. Playing the preliminary contest will be the Bee teams of both schools.

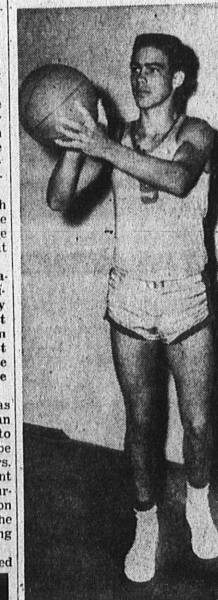
The Cees and Dees play the same afternoon in the Narbonne gym.

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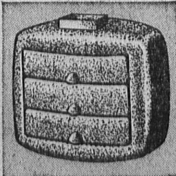


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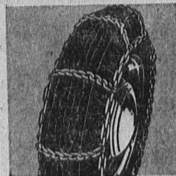
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
