Approximately 200 individual pictures of children with Santa Claus went into the mails yesterday from National Supply as the final item on the Christmas program held in the Civic Auditorium Saturday under the auspices of the Employee's Club.

Joseph Camp emceed the program which featured music by the Island Serenaders under the direction of Paul Strimling, dances by Ruth Ellen Larson and Carol Lynn, under the direction of Henry J. Vajner.
Of course, Santa Claus was there, too. He and his assistants handed out 1000 packages of candy, and 850 mechanical toys, dolls and other gifts to the kiddies. Santa was in each of those 200 individual pictures with the kids, too.
This was the first such party arranged by the National Supply Employee's Club which was organized about a year ago. Bender said this week, however, that the success of this first one practically insured that the parties would be continued in the future.

Woman Hurt in Crash

A pre-Christmas accident at Carson street and Vermont avenue last Saturday resulted in minor injuries for Mrs. Percy Smith, 59, 2020 1/2 Andree avenue, the California Highway Patrol reported.

Taxpayers in Artesia, Baldwin Park, Bellflower, Bell Gardens, Belvedere Gardens and Clearwater—and 63 other unofficial cities in Los Angeles County—have more than 80 per cent of their cost for police service paid for them by Torrance and other city taxpayers, a recent release from the Los Angeles County, Division of the League of California Cities reported.
The 45 official cities in the county not only paid for their own regular police service. In practice the uniform division and the detective and crime prevention division of the sheriff's department concentrate their activities in the unincorporated areas of the county. The cost of these two divisions last year was more than \$4,000,000.
This police service subsidy by city taxpayers to those living in the unofficial cities is the major item in a total free ride of nearly \$8,000,000 that unincorporated areas enjoy at the expense of city taxpayers.
Only one new city, Palos Verdes Estates, has been organized in Los Angeles since 1930. In the decade from 1940 to 1950, the population in the unofficial cities increased 102.5 per cent, more than twice the percentage increase in the incorporated cities.
These are some of the facts developed in a report completed after a year and a half study by the Los Angeles County Division of the League of California Cities. Ninety-five officials County worked on 14 sub-committees in making the survey. Don C. McMillan, city manager of Pasadena, was the general chairman.
The League of California Cities has announced that it will seek legislative remedy for these inequities to city taxpayers at the 1951 session of the State Legislature.
Legislation will be sought which will prohibit the furnishing of municipal-type services to unincorporated urban areas out of the general fund of the county, and to require the persons and property benefited to pay the cost through some form of special district or by annexation or incorporation.
