## Baron, Dandoy Spark Victory

Big Bill Baron-Aramis Dandoy and Company were the toast of the campus yesterday following the Tartars surprising 42-11 defeat over the powerful, long-leading Inglewood Sentinels here Tuesday afternoon.

In as close a game as the fans have seen since the Sentinels were here a year ago, the Tartars took an early lead and held on for the full four quarters. The score never was more than 5 points apart—and the Sentinels never got closer than 1 point to the Tartars.

The Sentinels, who still look like a shoo-in candidate for the Bay League title, were unable to penetrate the tight Tartar defense with any regularity. And, despite the considerable advantage in height, the Inglewood team saw many of the rebounds snatched out of the air by hard pressing Tartars.

Baron, who set a new school scoring record with 31 points against Leuzinger last Friday, had a cold day. Although he made 19 points, he was having tough luck on shot after shot in which he was open under the basket. Had he been as hot as he was last Friday, the game would have been a breeze for the Tartars.

Dandoy took second honors in the scoring department. He blasted in from the guard spot to lay in a total of 10 points during the afternoon. Jim Taylor scored 7 and Jim Nady 6.

Had the game lasted two seconds longer, the Tartar upset would have gone down the drain. An Inglewood forward got the ball and started toward the basket, shooting just after the final horn sounded. The shot was good—but it was too late—it didn't count.

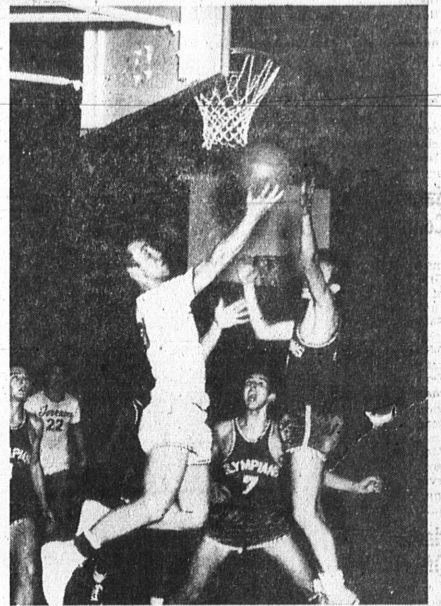
## Inglewood Bees Take 53-50 Tilt

Narbonne was the only school to place more than one man on either of the two teams.

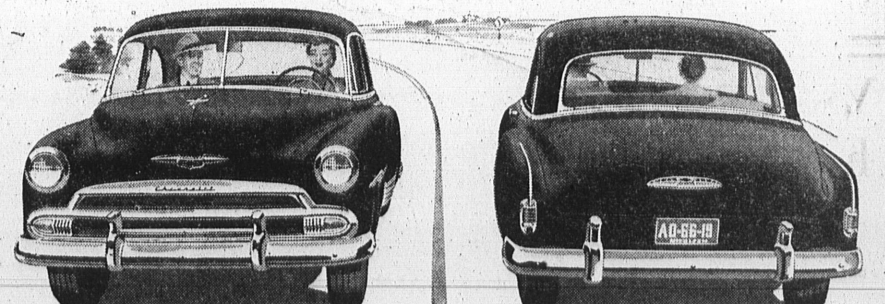
