Cost of Living Increases Due Aircraft Workers Here

The 350 employees of the North American Aviation plant here will receive a little extra money in their pay envelopes beginning next Monday as part of the company's \$200,000 cost of living allowance.

The allowances will be in addition to the \$7 million payroll now received each month by North American employees in the Los Angeles area.

Based upon the company's quarterly review of Bureau of Labor statistics cost of living figures, the adjustment is the first review made by North American since the program was inaugurated last October.

Company officials said the cost of living schedule provides for a one-cent an hour wage boost for every 1.14 points gain in the BLS index. An increase of 2.6 points in the index for the last quarter reviewed called for a two cents an hour wage adjustment. The next review will be made in April.

If the index falls, cost of living adjustments can be cut according to the same schedule used to determine increases, officials say. However, the base wage can not be reduced.

Alfred Emerson Assigned To Fort Ord for Duty

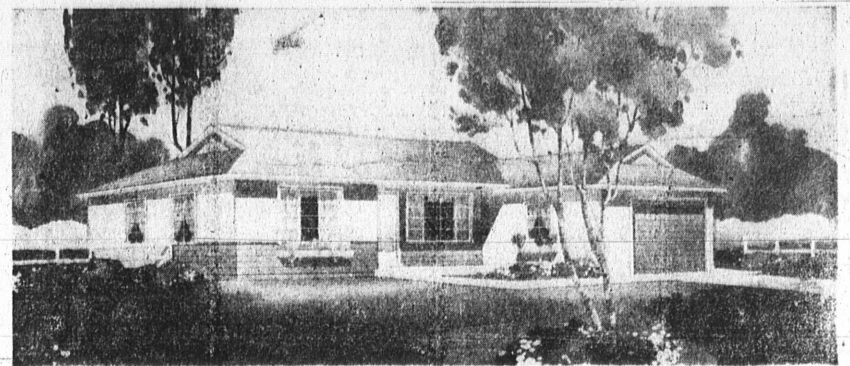
