

OK NEW WAGE PACT FOR 1951 New YWCA Clubhouse

Successful negotiation of a new mercantile contract, covering several fundred retail stores and sonie 800 clerks in the harbor area was amnounced this week by Haskiell Tidwell, secretary of Retail Clerks Local No. 905 and John T. Binkley, counsel for the Harbor Area Employers Council.

Under the new agreement, employers granted clerks a blanket weekly increase of \$5 a week in wages, in all classifications. A health-welfare (group insurance) program also was agreed upon covering all clerks and costing the employers \$2 per week per clerk. The contract now is effective and runs through January 31, 1952.

To meet the situation existing in surrounding communities, the employers were able to nego tiate out of the contract the Armistice Day holiday, according to Frank S. Selover, executive secretary of the Employers' Council. Six holidays are provided. New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas.

The employers also won amendments to the arbitration for stringthen and clarify this portion of the contract. The sickleave clause also was clarified and strengthened. Selover said, and the contract was winning favorable reaction from employers throughout the drea.

Wage scales for experienced eleks and other employees, for 40 hours a week, in various categories under the contract, now are as follows: Women, readytowear and specialty shops, \$55; men, miscellaneous, \$55; haberdashery and work clothing, \$70; hardware, plumbing and paint, \$70; floral designer, \$70; credit and collection manager, \$80; bookkeeper, \$70; cashier and general office, \$55; variety stores, \$60; polerly stores, men, \$85; women, \$60; pharmacists, \$45 hours, \$120; drug store, \$40; cashier and general office, \$55; variety stores, \$60; polerly stores, men, \$55; women, \$50; torck clerks, women, \$50; polerly stores, men, \$55; men, \$55; furniture, television and appliance, commission with \$70 guarantee.
