Enlistment of Women in Defense is Goal of NPBW

Appointment of Judge Mildred L. Lillie of the Los Angeles County Superior Court as civil defense chairman of the California Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs has been announced by Dorothy M. Donahoe, Bakersfield, state president. Judge Lillie will work with Clara L. Longstreth, Washington, D. C. attorney who was appointed in November to head the civil defense program of the National NPBW.

This post was created to extend the work already started in many local clubs. Miss Donahoe said. Nurses aid, refresher courses in first aid, measures to be taken in event of an atom bomb attack, fire-fighting methods, are some of the projects under way.

The new chairman will work through district and local committees to promote constructive attitudes and activities in matters affecting national security. Two-fold plan is to help arouse a sense of responsibility in a civil defense program and to help execute plans made by local authorities. Local chairmen are being asked in every case to coordinate their plans with the government officials handling civil defense.

According to Miss Donahoe, an attempt will be made to enlist every able woman in defense, either in the armed forces, in a full-time job or in volunteer work. A survey of available manpower in California communities was initiated following the state board meeting in Santa Barbara last August.

IT'S NOT TOO LATE...

"If payment for your 1950 Christmas Seals wasn't on your list of New Year's resolutions, it should have been."

That message was addressed to some 250,000 Los Angeles county families today by Kenneth Hartzell, secretary-treasurer of the Combined Christmas Seal Fund of the Los Angeles County-Tuberculosis and Health Association.

"Each year a number of folks receive and use Christmas Seals, but do not send in their checks or money orders until after the holidays," Hartzell explained. "This year, at least a quarter million families fall into this category; we hope, before the middle of the month to have heard from nearly all of them."

"Although we now have \$411,000 of our \$500,000 goal, there is no reason we should not reach the full amount. On the other hand, there is every reason why residents should pay for their Christmas Seals, for they represent a concrete investment in good health. Unless we do receive our full quota, we must of necessity curtail some of the vital tuberculosis control programs which we have offered the community to protect its well being," Hartzell warned.

Checks or money orders should be mailed to the Combined Christmas Seal Fund, Box 3735, Metropolitan Station, Los Angeles 55, he said.

SPAGHETTI SUPPER

A fine spaghetti "fed" will hit the spot some nippy evening this week. Do plan it for the family dinner or a company supper. And soon! Now, you may have your own special sauce, but we hope you'll try our recipe for a mighty savory one. That combination of bacon and beef with really excellent seasonings is marvelous. And gentle simmering develops those flavors to their luscious limit.

Do make plenty if you expect hearty appetites.

A huge tossed salad with your favorite dressing (or a new one like that on the butter-bowl salad) is a proper thing. Add French bread, treated with butter and garlic to your taste, and big cups of coffee to round out the meal.

Of course, you'll want a dessert, too. Fruit or a light sweet that carries a sharp fruit flavor is our suggestion. Something like a creamy lemon sherbet is just right. And here are those recipes we've mentioned.



Cut bacon into 1" pieces. Brown lightly in a large skillet or heavy saucepan. Add ground beef and cook until nicely browned. Push meat to side of skillet, add chopped onion and green pepper and brown well. Stir in tomatoes, tomato sauce and seasonings.

Cook uncovered, over low flame until mixture thickens to proper consistency. Allow 45 to 60 min. Serve over freshly cooked long spaghetti. Sprinkle generously with Parmesan cheese.

BUTTER BOWL SALAD
 1/2 head lettuce, shredded
 2 tomatoes, peeled and quartered
 1 grapefruit, peeled and segmented
 1 avocado, peeled and cubed
 3 Tbsp. chopped olives
 2 Tbsp. lemon juice
 salt and pepper to taste
 1/2 C. butter

Combine in salad bowl, lettuce, tomatoes, grapefruit sections, avocado and olives. Season with lemon juice, salt and pepper. Heat butter until foamy and golden brown. Pour immediately over salad. Toss ingredients until blended. Serve at once.

CREAMY LEMON SHERBET
 2 tsp. gelatin
 2 C. milk
 1 C. sugar
 1/2 C. lemon juice
 2 egg whites

Set refrigerator cold control at coldest position. Soak gelatin in 1/2 C. milk. Scald remaining milk with sugar. Dissolve gelatin in this mixture. Cool. Add lemon juice slowly. Freeze until mushy. Add unbeaten egg whites and salt. Beat well. Finish freezing. Return cold control to normal position.

SAVORY SPAGHETTI SAUCE
 4 slices bacon
 1 lb. ground beef
 1 large onion, chopped
 1 green pepper, chopped
 #2 1/2 can tomatoes
 1 can tomato sauce
 2 tsp. salt
 1 tsp. pepper
 1 to 2 tsp. oregano
 1 to 1 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
 2 tsp. sugar
