Gold Star Mothers Reveal Activities

Torrance Memorial Chapter of American Gold Star Mothers, in its fifth year includes mothers from Lomita, Redondo Beach, Gardena and Torrance. The original sixteen charter members increase to nearly sixty but at present due to losses the membership is but 42. However, several new members are being contacted and the unfortunate Korean crisis no doubt will render still more mothers eligible. During the last two years, Lucy Vigil of Redondo Beach as a faithful and untiring president, earned praise for the excellent service she rendered "over and beyond the call of duty."

Hospital work is the chief objective of the chapter in addition to caring for its own membership with cards, flowers, and visits to sick and bereaved mothers. One project is a monthly "party" for a ward in Brentwood Hospital of psychopathic cases. The patients seem to have benefited greatly by the warmth and cheer of these parties. The hospital authorities are enthusiastic in their appreciation. From 75 to 100 men are served each month with candy, popcorn, cookies, fruit, ice cream, punch and cigarettes; to mention some of the items. The parties carry the holiday motif of the month, December, for example, always presenting the Christmas theme. Mothers Helen Smith, Regina Cunningham, and Leona Smith of Torrance, who are dependable in helping, usually show up with a big box of homemade cookies. Probably anyone could make as good cookies as they do, but as much practice as they get, but one wonders. Cookies are tops with the men. Cleo Barnett is hospital chairman for 1951 and she will continue to see that the hospital service is kept up at the same high standard that Edith Erbe set last year.

Another interest of the chapter is their "salvage" sale for the benefit of the Gold Star Mothers' home, which is the goal and pet work of the national president, Eleanor Boyd of Long Beach. Each chapter is asked to undertake some money-making project for this home, so Torrance Memorial Chapter decided to save and gather papers and rags for this purpose. A local salvage company is cooperating with the chapter, with surprisingly good returns, and the chapter hopes to have a nice sum to send to the Home Fund, at the end of the year. Some of the mothers who do not participate in hospital work, contribute towards the cash fund in various ways. Martha Evans of Torrance, comes up every so often with a beautiful piece of hand work; Phyllis Hamilton of Lomita, has been a wonderful secretary for the organization since the chapter began, and in addition, she reflects glamour on the chapter by being a member of the National Chorus of the Gold Star Mothers, under the guidance of a Long Beach mother, and sings at various local chapters of this organization, and at the National Convention each year. The chapter looks forward to a good year, giving comfort to its members, to a large group of sick veterans, carrying on quietly and courageously in memory of the sons who gave their lives for their country. May the membership of this organization remain no larger than it is! Edith Erbe of Gardena is president for 1951 and she has the wholehearted support of the chapter.
