For the second time in as many years, National Supply Company's employee magazine, National News, has been recognized by the Freedom Foundation for its "outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American Way of Life."

Award of an honor medal—a 4-inch plaque depicting George Washington at prayer—was announced at the Freedom Foundation awards last Thursday in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. At that time, General Omar N. Bradley presented top awards to those who were judged to "speak up for freedom" in the most outstanding manner.

Edited by Blanche Nagy, National News was among several company employee magazines in the United States to receive the honor medal. Actual presentation of the award will be made sometime in the near future at a program at the University of Southern California.

National News won a similar honor at the Freedom Foundations Awards last year.
