Such favorite drivers as George Seegar, Bob Denny, Rosie Roselle, Howard Gardner, Chuck Meekins, and many more are tuning up their rods now for the 30-lap main Sunday.

Out of action for more than a month, most of the blister buggies should be in top shape after weeks of tuning and testing. Hotter speeds than the 80 MPH they averaged the last time out are being predicted for the rods.

Time trials begin at noon, the first of eight events follows at 2:30 p.m.

Varsity, Bees, Cees, Down Leuzinger High

Tartar athletes scored a clean sweep Monday and Tuesday of this week with a track victory over Leuzinger, and baseball and tennis victories over Huntington Beach.

In the first dual meet with a Bay League team this season, Coach Rex Welch's Varsity, Bee and Cee track squads scored three wins over the Leuzinger High School squads on the losers' field Tuesday afternoon.

The varsity led with a 73-31 victory while the Bees followed with a 51-45 win and the Cees defeated the Leuzinger Cees 40½ to 36½.

The varsity took first in all time events except the 100-yard dash, the low hurdles, and the 220-yard dash. In each of these cases, a Tartar was second.

Leuzinger did not field a varsity 880 relay team, and Torrance did not field a Bee 660 relay team, so the Tartar 880 and the Olympian 660 and a non-title match over the short course. Unaccustomed to the shorter distance, the Tartars were nosed out at the wire by what Coach Welch called "nothing." The end was practically a dead heat.

The Cees' 440-yard relay ended in a dead heat between the two schools.

Dandoy on League's Second Honor Team

Torrance was passed by when the All-Bay League basketball team was named yesterday afternoon.

Guard Aramis Dandoy, who was an all-league selection last year, was considered a strong contender to repeat this year, but wound up on the second team. Bill Baron, who led the league in scoring this year, was named to the third team. Only other Tartar named was Chic Cope, who received honorable mention.

Heading the list of All-Bay players was Forward Eric Wittenberg of Beverly Hills, the only unanimous choice. Sharing first-spot berths with him were Dave Evans and Stan Smith, of Inglewood; Mike Stellino, of Leuzinger; and Art Levinson, of Beverly Hills.

Commenting on the first team selections, Bay League officials said of Wittenberg that he was a "good floor man and rebounder . . . scored 39 points in one game . . . averaged 15 points a game for 27 games . . . outstanding on board control." He averaged 14.4 points per game in Bay League tilts.

Evans was said to be a "consistent player, a good shot . . . and a hard driver."

Smith, who was the All-Bay center, was the "high scorer on the Inglewood team, deadly on foul shots . . . and best rebounder."

Stellino was second in the voting for the All Bay team, while Levinson was selected for his outstanding defensive guarding. League statistics show that he held the opposition to 4 points a game, in league play.

Base stealing was the order of the day as the Tartars chalked up a total of six swiped sacks during the fray. Errors plagued the two teams—but Wolfe said a couple of more games should settle the boys down a bit.
