Only 27 Per Cent City Far Below Goal In Red Cross Drive

Torrance has attained only 27 per cent of its \$11,100 quota in the 1951 Red Cross campaign, Mrs. Gladys Weston, fund chairman, announced this week.

This figure includes all funds reported to local headquarters, 101 South Pacific avenue, Redondo Beach, as of last Friday.

Influenza, striking in the early weeks of the campaign, is blamed in a large part for the poor showing that has been made locally after five weeks of the drive. The Los Angeles area lags far behind all other major cities in percentage of goal attained, the local chairman said.

"The importance of Red Cross services to the armed forces and its commitments in the civil defense program makes it imperative that we keep working until our quota is met, and every citizen has been contacted and given a chance to contribute," Mrs. Weston said.

"There is a dangerous tendency for the public to be lulled into complacency by continuing news of victories in Korea. Casualties continue, and Red Cross services, especially blood and plasma to wounded in Korea and in hospitals at home, will continue to be needed until every man has returned home," she said.

Mrs. Weston asks volunteer workers to continue their efforts until their assignments have been completed.

ST. ANDREW'S LAUNCHES CHURCH FUND CAMPAIGN

Sunday April 8 will mark the opening of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church fund-raising campaign. During the following three weeks, members and friends of the church will be asked to subscribe to this fund which will be used to build the new educational unit now under construction.

"In planning the future of our church and community we must think in terms of our children," Rev. Arthur Bello, pastor, said. "Because we are not adequately equipped, we fail to meet our complete responsibility in preparing them for leadership."

"Today we have outgrown our building, which puts a definite ceiling on the church in our community. Its spiritual influence is far from what it might be," he said.

Most of the construction work is being donated by men of the church, who on Saturdays may be found on the job from 8 a.m. Jack Miller, on hand at all times, will welcome any and all who wish to assist with the work.
