Merchant Trio Buys Almond's; Name Changed

Beginning tomorrow, Almond's Department Store will be under new ownership, according to Harold Chaney, present owner, and Oscar Strumwasser, president of the company purchasing the local business.

Strumwasser will be associated in the operation of the department store at 1261 Sartori avenue with his brother, Arthur, and his brother-in-law, Jacob Strumwasser.

Oscar and Arthur for the past 18 years operated a highly respected and successful dry goods concern in Port of Spain, Trinidad, British West Indies.

The name of the local store has been changed to Strum's Department Store.

To remain as manager of the store will be Bob Almond, brother of the late John Almond. Until his death on October 16 of last year, John Almond was a partner in the store with Chaney. The store was originally called Chaney's until Almond became a partner at which time it was changed to Almond's Department Store.

SPILT DUTIES Oscar will take an active part in the supervision of the store while Arthur is planning a trip to New York where he will act as a buyer. Jacob will be associated in the management of the store on a part time basis.

The president of the company has two children, Mrs. Mina Rubenstein of Brentwood, and a son, Felix, now a pre-medical student at UCLA. Jacob's son, Eric, is a physicist with the Howard Hughes Aircraft Corporation. Arthur has two children living in New York.

Driver Honored By Union Oil

"The defensive driver expects and makes allowances for reckless and careless actions of others. He keeps constantly on the alert and thinks far enough ahead to be able to take the necessary preventive action before dangerous conditions cause accidents. He adjusts his driving to meet all hazards of weather, roads, traffic, and other conditions."

A class in home nursing to start April 26 (4 to 6 p.m.) was announced by Mrs. Beeman.

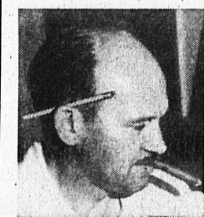
