In addition to the quartet, about 15 other members of the Torrance chapter of the SPEBSQSA will sing in the 300-voice male chorus led by Paul McFarbridge of Pasadena.

"The fact that we will be represented by a quartet and 15 members in the male chorus is pretty good, we think, for a club which has been chartered less than a month," according to Herb Allen, president of the local chapter.

The best two quartets from the Saturday night contest will compete in the society finals in Toledo, Ohio in June.

Serving under Allen as the new officers of the local group are Charles Bartholomew, vice-president; Howard Foster, secretary; Al Ewalt, treasurer; and Doug McClay, historian. Directors are Francis Lehr, Dean Lougee and Howard McDonald. Judging of the quartet contest will be based on five points, according to Allen. Each quartet will be judged on harmony, accuracy, balance and blend, voice expression, song arrangement and stage presence.
