Robillard, 67, retired this week after over 31 years as a carpenter and welder in Pacific Electric Railway's Torrance Shops. Although born in Collinsville, Connecticut, Robillard qualifies as a native, coming west in 1906 in time to see the devastation of the San Francisco earthquake.

During a two-year stay in Oregon, Robillard worked in a sawmill, harvested wheat, played semi-pro baseball, and met Joaquin Miller, the famed poet. In 1908, Robillard became a motorman with the Los Angeles Railway. He joined Pacific Electric in 1919.

"I'm proud of the many friends I've made in the Pacific Electric family," said Robillard. "And don't forget, I won the horseshoe championship of the Torrance Shops in 1926."

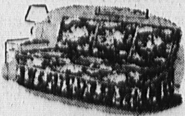
