Local Plants To Fly 'E' Flags May 19

In observance of Armed Forces Day, May 19, local industrial plants which received the Army-Navy "E" award for outstanding production during the World War II propose to fly the hoisted "E" pennant.

The Army-Navy "E" award was granted only to facilities which were particularly outstanding in production for the War and Navy departments. Excellence in quality and quantity of production were the determining factors in granting awards to industrial plants by the War and Navy departments.

Local plants earning the flag were the Doak Aircraft Company with three stars; the Pelzer Manufacturing Company with four stars; and the National Supply Company with three stars.

Plants which maintained an outstanding record of performance for six months after receiving the original Army-Navy award were granted a star award consisting of a white star on their "E" flag.

Additional stars were won for continued outstanding performance for succeeding six month periods until the flag carried four stars, after which the interval was increased to one year.
