COLLEGE TO GIVE TEST TO DRAFT ELIGIBLES

Draft deferment tests for eligible male students of draft age will be given Saturday, May 26, at 8:30 a.m., at El Camino College Campus Center. The college is located at the corner of Crenshaw and Redondo Beach boulevards.

The three-hour test will begin at 9 a.m., but the applicants must check in at 8:30 a.m.

Applicants must have filed a request for the examination with their local draft boards, and present validated tickets of admission at the college when they take the test. The test may be taken only once. There is no charge.

To be eligible for the test students must be registered under the Selective Service Act, must be under 26 years of age, and must be pursuing a full-time course of studies toward a college degree or a course satisfactory to transfer to a degree-granting institution.

The test will cover social science, natural science, and mathematical reasoning. They will not be factual tests, but will be concerned with the ability of the examinee to learn.

Civic Group Seeks Court Action To Halt Construction of School

Round two in the battle of the Riviera this week when a spokesman for the Hollywood Riviera Community Association announced that the organization had filed for a court injunction to halt the construction of a private school there.

JURY PROTESTS

Basis of the protest over the site is the claim that Trier has failed to comply with deed restrictions which make it mandatory that all plans be approved by the Art Jury of the Community Association. Trier maintained that the deed restriction applied only to residential construction.
