

POLICE NOT AUTHORIZED TO GIVE DRIVER TESTS

Torrance's Police Department is not authorized to give driver license examinations, Police Chief John Stroh reminded motorists this week.

New licenses and renewals are issued by the State Department of Motor Vehicles on the first, third and fifth Monday of each month only. The written and eye examinations are given in the council chambers of the City Hall and not in the police department, Stroh pointed out. The hours are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Motorists seeking a new license or a renewal are directed to park their cars on El Prado, on the west side of the City Hall to expedite the practical road test.

Fee for a new license is \$2, while 50 cents is charged for a renewal which must be applied for every four years.

Council Briefs

Backers of the plan to erect an adult recreation center to be constructed on city property at the rear of the main library won support from the City Council at its last meeting.

The city fathers agreed to a recommendation from the Recreation Commission that funds from the city's capital outlay budget as of June 20 be earmarked for the development of the center.

The project, including an enclosed clubroom, kitchen facilities, rest rooms and outdoor shuffleboard courts and horseshoe courts would cost approximately \$5000 to \$7000, according to material costs at the time of construction.

Other business conducted by the council included the following:

Opened bids for the construction of the North Torrance sewer and referred them to the city manager for a recommendation of the lowest responsible bidder. Back Grubbs was low bidder with \$51,309.25, while \$62,755.25 was the highest bid.

Directed a letter be sent to the North Torrance Improvement Association in answer to its request for information on the progress of the library building.

City Manager George W. Stevens reported that plans were being prepared and if county approval could be secured bids would be called for during June. A request from the same organization regarding a water hole near the street at McMaster Park was referred to the engineering department for action.

Approved of the appointment of J. J. Benner to serve his probationary period as Fire

Chief effective May 8, 1951. Approved of the employment of Bruce Gooler as a member of the Torrance Police Department.

Granted permanent status to R. G. Collins and William Russell as members of the Torrance Fire Department.

The following appropriations were approved:

To Barclay Surveying Company for engineering services, the sum of \$500.

To Logan R. Cotton and Bruce Brown for accounting services for January to March, the sum of \$1,250.

To Torrance Chamber of Commerce for advertising and publicity for January to March, the sum of \$1,250.

To H. B. Adair Construction Company for installation of curbs and gutters, the sum of \$950.10.

For repairing and improving the main entrance to the airport, the sum of \$950 from Airport funds.

Agreed to erect four-way stop signs at Cabrillo avenue and Middlebrook road, and one-way on road from Torrance Sand and Gravel Company at Crenshaw boulevard.

Granted a permit to the Torrance Veterans' Council to sell fireworks.
