The men are unfit for service (line) are being weeded out and given They (the sergeants) spend jobs they can perform. most of their time finding out a way of beating this army and pointing out the mistakes that the army makes. All this is done in front of the men, consequently the morals is very low in the battalion.

My impression of a non-commissioned officer is (and always will be) that he must be able to receive and obey orders. Also to see that the men are taken care of. This particular group (all from the Torrance area) have been very selfish and thinking of no one but themselves. If it is signatures that are needed, I shall get the backbone of the army to sign—the private!
