## Adult Program to Hold Summer Time Classes

Classes in the adult educational program will continue to be held throughout the summer, it was announced this week by Donald Manshaw, director.

Although the classes are aimed at catering to adults, children who feel they may benefit by attending the summer session classes are invited to attend, Manshaw said. High school students may receive credit for attending the classes.

Starting June 11 and ending July 28, a total of 22 different classes will be conducted during the adult education program during the summer.

Classes will include typing, shorthand, dressmaking, physical fitness, social dancing, square dancing and a wide variety of crafts, including cake decorating, ceramics, lamp shades, leathercraft and textile painting.

The blueprint and industrial training course held each Tuesday night trains men for both wartime and civilian industrial jobs. The machine shop class trains both men and women, beginning and advanced, in a dozen phases of shop operation which equips people for high-paying, substantial jobs with security.
