15 Directors For Chamber Being Considered

Currently under consideration by members of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce is a proposal which, if adopted, will increase the number of directors on the Chamber board from nine to 15 members.

The measure is a recommendation of Henry W. Creeger, president of the Chamber who declared June 18 as Election Day for the purpose of tabulating ballots now in the hands of chamber members.

"Torrance has grown in population from 9,950 in 1940 to approximately 30,000 as of this date. We have enjoyed a healthy industrial and home development and it is the view of your board of directors that the Chamber can better serve this community by expanding our board from nine to 15 members," wrote Creeger in a recent letter to all members.

To increase the board's members the Chamber's by-laws must be amended by consent of the majority of the membership.

The present Board at its meeting May 21 unanimously agreed to the desirability of increasing the number serving on Board of Directors to 15 members.

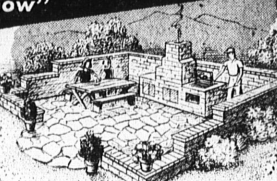
SELF-STARTERS
