Cole Turns Down JC Coaching Job

Former Tartar Mentor Accepts Teaching Post

After spending several sleepless nights considering all the angles, former Tartar Grid Coach Eddie Cole announced the week that he had decided to turn down an offer to become grid coach at Chaffey Junior College to accept a teaching position with Mira Costa High School in Manhattan Beach.

"The decision to give up coaching, a profession in which I have spent several years, wasn't easy to reach," Cole said.

"The offer from Chaffey Junior College was as fine a position as any coach could hope for," he said, "but I sent them a telegram this week saying I was accepting another contract."

OPTION DROPPED

Cole was sent job hunting this spring when he was notified that his contract at Torrance would not be renewed for the 1957-58 school year. He started his grid duties here in the fall of 1947

and continued through 1948 and 1949. Last year, he was in Japan with the 452nd Bomb Group during the grid season but was released from the service early this year.

The coach-turned-teacher will probably have about five periods of freshman orientation and student counseling the first year. He plans to return to college to get an administrative credential which will put him in line for a vice-principals or a principalship in the future.

Cole and his family live at 1639 West 219th street. He has no immediate plans to move, he said.
